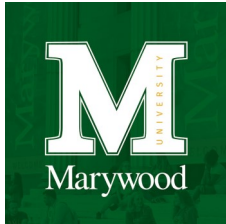
September Cooking Classes

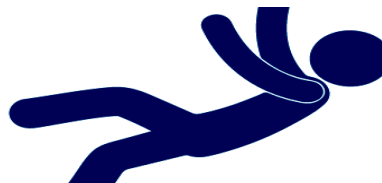

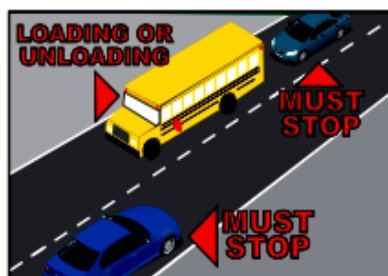
Keeping Children Safe

PENNSYLVANIA'S SCHOOL BUS STOPPING LAW

- ◆ When you meet or overtake a stopped school bus with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you **MUST STOP**.
- ◆ When you approach an intersection where a school bus is stopped with red signal lights flashing and stop arm extended, you **MUST STOP**.
- ◆ You **MUST STOP** at least ten (10) feet away from the school bus.
- ◆ You **MUST WAIT** until the red lights have stopped flashing and the stop arm has been withdrawn before moving.
- ◆ **DO NOT MOVE** until all the children have reached a place of safety.

KNOW YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

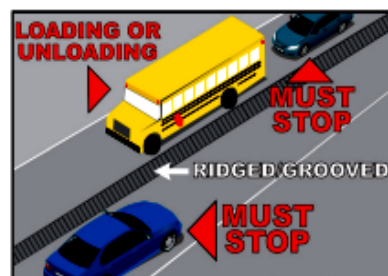
- ◆ 1.5 million children are transported on Pennsylvania roads each day.
- ◆ These children are transported approximately 400 million miles to school each year.
- ◆ To further promote safety, school vehicles may be equipped with a yellow flashing or revolving light.
- ◆ Every year, children are needlessly injured or killed by drivers passing stopped school buses.



You **MUST STOP** on roadways with or without painted lines.



You **MUST STOP** at an intersection, whether it is or is not marked with a stop sign. All traffic **MUST STOP**.



You **MUST STOP** on roadways with ridged/grooved dividers.

September is National Service Dog Month

September is the month that we pay tribute to all the animals who are specially trained to support Americans who are dealing with vision impairment, medical issues, and mental health issues, to include PTSD. There are special legal protections to allow both dog and owner to be in places where there is otherwise a no animals permitted or no pets policy.

Service dogs should not be confused with comfort animals or house pets. While these animals are very beneficial to their owners, they are not allowed access under the law, to all places that official service dogs are permitted. It can take as long as two years and up to \$40,000 to train a formal service dog. There is no single breed of preferred service dog. Training for service dogs varies depending on emphasis. Medical alert dogs will have a different skill set than those who assist and alert for a PTSD episode. In some cases, VA benefits cover services dogs. Veterans should meet with their health care provider to discuss their physical or mental health limitations to determine if a service dog is an appropriate treatment approach. If it is determined that a service dog is ideal, an application is submitted on behalf of the veteran. Each case is reviewed by a clinician to assess the goals to be accomplished by use of a service dog and the ability and means of the veteran and/or caregiver to care for the dog. For more up-to-date information on service dogs for veterans, please contact your nearest VA medical center.

I would be remiss if I failed to note that September is also National Suicide Prevention Month. Suicide is one of the leading causes of death among veterans. Wayne County has one of the highest rates of suicide in the state. To quote the American Legion's program "**BE THE ONE**," **BE THE ONE** to end the stigma of veteran suicide. **BE THE ONE** to save a veteran. **If you, or someone you know has thoughts of suicide, please, please call the Suicide Crisis Line at 988 followed by pressing number 1.** Counselors care, and they can help. Thank you.

How to Spot Financial Abuse

Domestic violence is often depicted as physical acts of abuse, likely because that's the most obvious to an onlooker. Unfortunately, there are many other, subtler ways an abuser can gain power and control over another person. One of the more nefarious ways is through financial abuse.

Financial abuse is any means by which one individual can leverage financial security over another to keep them under their thumb. This can include:

- Refusing to let a partner hold or manage money
- Refusing to let a partner take out a credit card or open a bank account in their own name
- Refusing to let a partner work to earn money of their own
- Sabotaging a partner's job so they lose employment

Financial abuse can occur between married couples and among dating relationships. It can also take place between parents and adult children, with abuse coming from either direction.

When one person holds all the cards, it makes it extremely difficult for a survivor to escape. With no access to their own funds, they can't purchase food for themselves. With no finances or credit, they can't rent or buy a car, apartment, or house. Without a car, especially in rural areas like Wayne County, holding a job is extremely difficult if not impossible. Financial abuse can make a survivor entirely dependent upon their abuser, which makes escaping that situation incredibly difficult.

Wayne Tomorrow! Hosts On-Site Visit for Case Study

After the Appalachian Regional Commission hired The Working Partners firm to assess the impact of some 200 grants, they selected a handful of communities and organizations to help illustrate successes in various areas to feature in a Case Study. Wayne Tomorrow! has been chosen for one of two Case Studies on Community Connections, from among the 13 states in the ARC territory.



The development of The Stourbridge Project Co-Working Space & Business Incubator marked the first public impact project to come out of the Wayne Tomorrow! collaboration. It also represents the first of what would become several grants from the Appalachian Regional Commission in support of Wayne Tomorrow! projects.

Wayne County, the Wayne Economic Development Corporation and other partners used that grant to help fund the development of The Stourbridge Project, which also engages the Wayne-Pike Workforce Alliance to offer business development programming at the site.

Two representatives from Working Partners visited the county recently to learn more about Wayne Tomorrow! and how it got started as well as how it sustains interest and support in the community for more than 10 years. The day began with the monthly Community Impact Network, which met in the morning and included an open discussion to answer questions.

The representatives toured The Stourbridge Project and had an opportunity to talk with individuals and businesses that use the facility or benefit from its programs. Members of the Agriculture Task Force met them at The Cooperage Project to discuss important partnerships that have formed around addressing food insecurity and strengthening the local food system, which was followed by a stop at Hawley's Bingham Park to see the new AgroLegacy-Certified Local brand in action at the Farmer's Market.

Finally, they visited the Hamlin Community Library to learn more about the Community Hubs Task Force, which is supporting Hamlin and Newfoundland Area Public Library efforts to expand their physical spaces in order to provide more services to the public and create places where people can connect to one another, to services and to entertainment.

"This visit is just the latest example of how Wayne Tomorrow! and the powerful collaboration it represents is generating interest from communities and agencies looking to replicate our successes, particularly when it comes to community engagement," said Community Network Specialist Mikki Uzupes.
